Osborn, Charles 1/27/1938 - 2/23/2022 Haines City, Florida Charles Osborn was born on January 27, 1938 to John and Marie Osborn of Ann Arbor; he was the couple's second child, born 18 years after sister Marilyn. Charles led an interesting life from the start - father John was the Sheriff of Washtenaw County and the family lived in the residence quarters of the Ann Street jail where Mother Marie was Matron of the jail and Charles (Chuck) helped distribute meals. He graduated from Ann Arbor High School and met the love of his life, Marileigh Lamson, at Eastern Michigan University. The couple married in 1959 and had daughter, Kimberly, granddaughter, Alyssa and great-granddaughter, Fiona. Charles spent 25 years as a Fire Fighter for the Ann Arbor Fire Department. After retiring from the Fire Department, he continued serving the city of Ann Arbor, working in the public schools as a substitute teacher caller, a special education aid, a councilor - he even drove the Book Mobile! Charles was a man of many talents and interests including

painting, playing the ukulele, refurbishing, and riding bicycles and motorcycles, target shooting and camping. Chuck was known for his charisma. After moving to Florida, he became known for his one-liners in the community. He is beloved by his wife and family who feel so grateful to have had him in their lives. His memory will live on through many but most especially through his wife, Marileigh, his daughter, Kimberly, granddaughter, Alyssa, and son-in-law Laky.

#### In the Know...

#### The History of Yellowstone Park

President Grant signed the bill creating the nation's first national park at Yellowstone on March 1, 1872.

Native Americans had lived and hunted in the region that would become Yellowstone for hundreds of years before the first Anglo explorers arrived. Abundant game and mountain streams teeming with fish attracted the Indians to the region, though the awe-inspiring geysers, canyons, and gurgling mud pots also fascinated them.

John Colter, the famous mountain man, was the first Anglo to travel through the area. After journeying with Lewis and Clark to the Pacific, Colter joined a party of fur trappers to explore the wilderness. In 1807, he explored part of the Yellowstone plateau and returned with fantastic stories of steaming geysers and bubbling cauldrons. Some doubters accused the mountain man of telling tall tales and jokingly dubbed the area "Colter's Hell."

Before the Civil War, only a handful of trappers and hunters ventured into the area, and it remained largely a mystery. In 1869, the Folsom-Cook expedition made the first formal exploration, followed a year later by a much more thorough reconnaissance by the Washburn-Langford-Doane expedition. The key to Yellowstone's future as a national park, though, was the 1871 exploration under the direction of the government geologist Ferdinand Hayden. Hayden brought along William Jackson, a pioneering photographer, and Thomas Moran, a brilliant landscape artist, to make a visual record of the expedition. Their images provided the first visual proof of Yellowstone's wonders and caught the attention of the U.S. Congress.

Early in 1872, Congress moved to set aside some 2 million acres of public land straddling the future states of Wyoming, Montana and Idaho as America's first national park. President Grant signed the bill into law on this day in 1872. The Yellowstone Act of 1872 designated the region as a public "pleasuring-ground," which would be preserved "from injury or spoilation, of all timber, mineral deposits, natural curiosities, or wonders within."

For a nation bent on settling and exploiting the West, the creation of Yellowstone was surprising. Many congressmen gave it their support simply because they believed the rugged and isolated region was of little economic value. Yet the Yellowstone Act of 1872 set a precedent and popularized the idea of preserving sections of the public domain for use as public parks. Congress went on to designate dozens of other national parks, and the idea spread to other nations around the world.

Last month we reviewed the timeframes for Hurricane Season in Florida. At Lake Hammock Village we have two types of residents. Full time residents are here year-round and need to be prepared throughout the year. **Snowbirds** make up a good portion of our population. It is difficult to track **Snowbirds** as there is no set pattern for their comings and goings.

As of this issue of Gator Tales we are now entering **April**. In the past this is a time when people begin to think about leaving to return to their other homes for the summer months. The Emergency Preparedness Team will be starting to meet and, hopefully, before you read this, the Team will have met.

#### **To Our Snowbirds:**

- The Team is here to help you in any way we can.
- LHV management asks you to fill out a form with contact information. Our Team would like to share this information in case we have the need to contact you to help in some way.
- Most of the Snowbirds remove any loose objects and also have people keeping an eye on things for them.
- Please feel free to contact our Team if any questions or if you need help.
- Please be sure to remove yard objects and other things that might be dangerous flying around in hurricane winds
- We recommend that you not use a steel chain as these have been known to become projectiles in strong winds
- If any Snowbirds are interested in becoming Team members, let one of us know.
- We look forward to working more closely with you to help keep everyone safe!

#### 2022 Planning:

- To all residents, please consider joining us as a volunteer. Our Team is dedicated to helping our neighbors. All members are residents!
- If you decide to volunteer, **YOU CHOOSE** what you would like to do and how much time you have available. We all help and support each other.
- There are many different things that need to be done, many of which involve talking to neighbors and identifying those needing assistance.
- As mentioned last month, we have divided LHV into eight Zones or 'neighborhoods.' There are about 25 homes in each Zone. Each Zone has at least one or more volunteers helping to talk with people in that Zone.
- Our Team has a large bulletin Board in the Clubhouse. Information is posted regularly.
- We will be talking soon with Polk County Emergency Management to discuss working together as we have for the past four years.

#### **Snowbird Pre-Departure Checklist**

Item (Note: All items are recommendations)	Comments
Landscaper	Be sure a landscaper is in place to maintain the trimming & edging of your lawn on a weekly basis.  Be sure a landscaper is in place to maintain your shrubs and weed flower beds at least once per month
Power Washer	Have a vendor set-up in the event your home needs to be pressure washed.
Turn OFF Hot Water Heater Turn Off the water to your home* *but leave the sprinkler system on	If you choose to do this, you MUST turn the power off to your Hot Water Heater or you could damage your hot water heater. This could prevent broken pipes inside of your home
Sprinkler System	Set to water only times per week and no more than hour per zone. Do not set the system to water between _am & _pm Check to ensure the Sprinkler Rain Sensor is working to prevent overwatering during rainy periods.
Secure Items Outside of your home  Note: In the event of a severe storm, the maintenance staff will not be able to secure items at your home as they will have other duties to perform to secure the community.	Remove and store away any birdbaths or feeders Remove and store away any patio furniture Remove and store away any trash containers Remove and store any wind chimes or ornaments Remove any other items outside of the home that are not secure as they could become damaging flying objects Secure hurricane shutters prior to departure or make arrangements with someone to close them in the event of any potentially damaging storms.
Items Inside of your home	Be sure that food items that can "Go Bad" while you are away have been disposed of. Be sure your washer & dryer are empty  Be sure your dish washer is empty.  Be sure all doors and windows are securely locked  Talk to a friend/neighbor about checking your home on a regular basis while you are away.  Leave the Air-Conditioner on to prevent mold growth (80-85 recommended)
Notification	Please leave a set of keys to your home with a friend or neighbor in case access is needed in an emergency. Please notify the office as to who may have the keys.  Please notify the office of your departure date, probable return date & information as to how we can contact you in an emergency

#### **April Space Coast Launch Forecast**

April 1, 2022, 12:24pm A Falcon 9 Rocket will launch a group of satellites for various customers on

the Transporter 4 mission. This launch will head south and the booster will

attempt to return for a landing back at Cape Canaveral.

**April 3, 2022, 1:13pm** Space X will launch a Falcon 9/Dragon rocket carrying the private Axiom-1

crew (4) to the International Space Station. This launch will head to the

North.

**April 19, 2022 6:45am** Following the Axiom-1 mission, NASA will launch the next group of 4

astronauts on a Space-X Dragon 2 capsule/Falcon 9 to the International


Space Station as well.

Late April Another group of Star link Satellites will launch on another Falcon 9 rocket.

Note: NASA rolled out the new SLS Moon Rocket to Pad 39B on March 17, 2022

for a series of tests preparing it to fly on its first unmanned mission around

#### Cape History, The day the US lost a Snark missile.

Deployed in the late 1950's the Snark was our first nuclear armed cruise missle capable of reaching the Soviet Union, prior to our larger ICBM's entering service. It's development was marred by many failures and the reporters used to call the Atlantic shore off of Cape Canaveral "Snark Infested Waters". On one test launch in December 1956, a Snark launched from the Cape was supposed to fly around Puerto Rico and head back for a landing at the Cape's "Skid Strip". This missile however ignorered commands and just kept heading South, destruct signals were then sent but had no affect. Fighter jets were then also scambled to shoot it down but could not catch up with it. The last radar images showed it crossing the South American coast near Venezuela and then it disapeared without a trace, for over 27 years. In 1983 however, a farmer in Northeastern Brazil discovered the apparent wreckage in the tropical rain forest there.




