

Marian and Richard Spiegel Married September 5, 1964

Marian and Dick (Richard) were both from Wisconsin and met when Marian was thirteen and Dick was 15 years old.

On Sundays, Marian and her girlfriend would go to the local movie theatre to see a show for fifty cents. This was the first time Marian and Dick met. He was with his friend, and they asked if they could sit with them.

The girls were fine with that at first with Marian sitting with Dick, but eventually Dick's friend wanted to switch girls. Both Marian and her friend quickly put a stop to that since they both did not like his friend. He was trying to get fresh!

Marian and Dick were attending different high schools and did not see each other often. Marian went on to a school for cosmetology in Green Bay and began working in a beauty salon while Dick took various jobs such as being a paperboy before heading off to the Navy.

While Dick was on leave from the Navy and in the neighborhood where Marian worked, they reconnected and started their romance by first class mail. This lasted about a year until Dick came home in February 1964.

During their courtship they went bike riding, swimming, and later boating in Lake Winnebago; drinking in18 year old bars and of course to lover's lane. Dick even played polka music on his accordion for Marian.

In August of 1964 Dick proposed to Marian. One month later they were married in the local Lutheran Church with their best friends bearing witness. (Note: SHE WAS NOT PREGNANT! It took two years before that happened.)

Their first home was an apartment above a bar in the same neighborhood where Marian worked. While Marian worked in the salon, Dick went to truck driving school. After he graduated, he began hauling 2 to 3 nights a week and later increased that to 3 to 4 nights. In 1986 Dick became the owner of his own truck.

When at home, Dick loved to hang out in the garage making sure that his rig was in top shape for his next run; or he would be tinkering with the old cars he had been collecting.

Two years later, suspicions of an earlier pregnancy long ago dismissed, Marian and Dick gave birth to their daughter Lisa, on September 7, 1966. Their second daughter, Cindy, arrived exactly two years later to the day, on September 7, 1968.



In 1972 when the girls were 5 and 7, Marian became the proud owner of the salon in which she had been working. While at work, various neighbors and family helped with the children so they were never alone.

Dick's father took care of them and fed them frequently. He would spoil them by buying them candy at the store and getting them all riled up. At other times, a neighbor would watch them at her house when they got off the school bus with her children.

The girls enjoyed picnics in grandpa's backyard, swinging and sliding at the park and even boating. Fishing did not work out well with the girls as they were too young and noisy.

Life was hard for them at this time, but they were grateful they had friends and family to help. Dick was on the road most days while Marian was juggling motherhood and her salon.

As the girls got older, it became even more important for them to watched by adults. After all teenage girls attract teenage boys.

The eldest, Lisa, got married out of high school and moved away. She has given Marian and Dick three grandchildren. Cindy, the youngest, went truck driving with Dick after high school until her fiancé' insisted she stop when they got married. They went on and gave Marian and Dick one grandchild.

At one point, Dick and a friend of his considered moving to Alaska when they retired. Unfortunately, his friend and his wife passed away, and since Marian did not like the cold, they moved to Florida.

In October it will be 20 years since they came to Lake Hammock Village. They are known by many at the park and on most Mondays are at Bingo with Dick working the game and Marian playing at her favorite table.

# Peak Hurricane Season is Still Here! Don't Stop Preparing!

As of October 1<sup>st</sup> we are two thirds / 67% through hurricane season with **only two more months to go**.

But we know these are very tough months. So, you need to stay alert and watch the weather closely. Don't relax and take things for granted. That is when a hurricane will come up quickly and bite you in the foot.

We continue to outline the Team's recommendations. Due to space considerations we can't repeat all of it, so please look back at prior issues for this information.

Here are a few suggestions:

- \* Take time to look at over the information the Team has provided and think about what choices you would make when a hurricane threatens us. Unlike minor decisions which we make every day, our decisions regarding hurricane preparation affect your safety.
- \* **Remember**, you will only have two or three days to make important decisions. Use it wisely.
- \* You need to have a plan. Will you 'stay and ride it out' on your own? Or, do you plan to leave? If you stay, make sure you have food supplies and that all your outdoor decorations are in a safe place, etc.
- \* Remember: Don't rely on others! YOU ARE ULTIMATELY RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR OWN SAFETY!
- \* Keep an eye on the weather. An excellent source is the National Hurricane Center at https://www.nhc.noaa.gov
- \* When a 'Hurricane Watch' is issued, this means a storm is expected within 48 hours.
- \* At that time our Team will schedule a Special / Emergency Meeting and post signs for all to attend if interested also will be posted on Facebook.
- \* Keep stocking up on food, water, batteries, etc. Don't follow the example of one of our former residents (see below) who waited too long!




Charlie waited too long. Don't make the same mistake. Remember to fill up on gas, remove excess objects from your yard, etc.

# **Threats Not Taken Lightly**

If you watched a news conference we held recently, you know that we arrested a high school football player who threatened to commit a mass shooting at George Jenkins High School (Lakeland). Our deputies treated the information we received seriously and quickly. We immediately placed the school on heightened security, restricting access, sheltered the students in place, and conducted a thorough search to insure the safety of all students and staff. We found the responsible teen, pulled him out of school, and arrested him.

He did not have a firearm. His call was false, fortunately. But we treated it as real, as we should have.

This school year we've already made several arrests of juveniles who made bad choices to threaten to hurt someone or commit violence at a school either via a phone call, text message, or social media message. These calls were swiftly handled by our law enforcement and school professionals.

I've said it before and I will continue to say it – in this day and age where we are all focused on preventing violence from occurring in our schools, words matter. There is no longer any leeway given to anyone who threatens to shoot up a school, to place a bomb in a school, or to hurt anyone in a school. The mere threat will land you in jail, regardless of your age.

Parents, I am asking you to be the first line of defense when it comes to keeping kids safe. Many children over the age of 10 have some sort of mobile or online device, whether it's a cell phone, iPad, or gaming device. Children are being raised to use those devices as a major form of communication, but if they are not taught at an early age that what they send or transmit to someone else can result in them being charged with a crime, the consequences can be harsh.

Don't let your child become an example of what not to do. Monitor what they're doing online. Report suspicious activity. And please, please coach your kids that threatening words matter – and they can land you in jail.


