

### **Peak Hurricane Season Approaching!** Time to Start Taking Things Seriously!

We are now entering **Month 4** of hurricane season and moving into **Peak Season**. We have been urging everyone to prepare themselves for the inevitable storms by purchasing batteries, water, non-perishable items and other necessities. If you have not begun, do not delay any longer! This is not the time to procrastinate. We have also encouraged you to have a plan to stay or evacuate (see August edition of Gator Tales). See recent article below:

#### NOAA still expects above-normal Atlantic hurricane season Preparedness is key during the peak months of hurricane season

Atmospheric and oceanic conditions still favor an above-normal 2022 Atlantic hurricane season, according to NOAA's annual mid-season update issued today by the <u>Climate Prediction Center</u>, a division of the National Weather Service.

"I urge everyone to remain vigilant as we enter the peak months of hurricane season," said Secretary of Commerce Gina Raimondo. "The experts at NOAA will continue to provide the science, data and services needed to help communities become hurricane resilient and climate-ready for the remainder of hurricane season and beyond."

NOAA forecasters have slightly decreased the likelihood of an above-normal Atlantic hurricane season to 60% (lowered from the <u>outlook issued in May</u>, which predicted a 65% chance). The likelihood of near-normal activity has risen to 30% and the chances remain at 10% for a below-normal season.

"We're just getting into the peak months of August through October for hurricane development, and we anticipate that more storms are on the way," said NOAA Administrator Rick Spinrad, Ph.D. "NOAA stands ready to deliver timely and accurate forecasts and warnings to help communities prepare in advance of approaching storms."

<u>NOAA's update to the 2022 outlook — which covers the entire six-month hurricane season that ends on Nov. 30 — calls for 14-20 named storms (winds of 39 mph or greater), of which 6-10 could become hurricanes (winds of 74 mph or greater). Of those, 3-5 could become major hurricanes (winds of 111 mph or greater). NOAA provides these ranges with a 70% confidence.</u>

So far, the season has seen three named storms and no hurricanes in the Atlantic Basin. An average hurricane season produces 14 named storms, of which seven become hurricanes, including three major hurricanes.

This outlook is for overall seasonal activity and is not a landfall forecast. Landfalls are largely governed by shortterm weather patterns that are currently only predictable within about one week of a storm potentially reaching a coastline.

There are several atmospheric and oceanic conditions that still favor an active hurricane season. This includes La Niña conditions, which are <u>favored</u> to remain in place for the rest of 2022 and could allow the ongoing <u>high-activity</u> <u>era</u> conditions to dominate, or slightly enhance hurricane activity.

In addition to a continued La Niña, weaker tropical Atlantic trade winds, an active west African Monsoon and likely above-normal Atlantic sea-surface temperatures set the stage for an active hurricane season and are reflective of the ongoing high-activity era for Atlantic hurricanes.

"Communities and families should prepare now for the remainder of what is still expected to be an active hurricane season," said Ken Graham, director of the National Weather Service. "Ensure that you are ready to take action if a hurricane threatens your area by developing an evacuation plan and gathering hurricane supplies now, before a storm is bearing down on your community."

Learn about NOAA's hurricane science and forecasting expertise by viewing our <u>Hurricane Season Media Resource</u> <u>Guide</u> and stay tuned to the <u>National Hurricane Center</u> for the latest about tropical storm and hurricane activity in the Atlantic.

"Although it has been a relatively slow start to hurricane season, with no major storms developing in the Atlantic, this is not unusual and we therefore cannot afford to let our guard down," said FEMA Administrator Deanne Criswell. "This is especially important as we enter peak hurricane season—the next Ida or Sandy could still be lying in wait. That's why everyone should take proactive steps to get ready by downloading the <u>FEMA app</u> and visiting <u>Ready.gov</u> or <u>Listo.gov</u> for preparedness tips. And most importantly, make sure you understand your local risk and follow directions from your state and local officials."

#### Remember.....

When a Hurricane is coming, you will be faced with making important life decisions that affect your safety very quickly! Consider the following:

- You will probably have two or three days to make important decisions.
- ♦ This is better than a tornado which has zero notice! You will have some time Use it well!
- ♦ You need to have a Plan for when this occurs and history tells us this time will come at some point.
- You have received a Shelter Map. Look at it! If all else fails, you can go to a public shelter.
- First try to identify what you would do.
- Do you plan to stay with family or friends? Remember that family and friends are also dealing with the same hurricane situation! They may mean well, but conditions may prevent them from getting to you. Traffic on I-4, Route 27, and most Florida highways is slow, unreliable, and unpredictable.
- ✤ Have a plan! TAKE CARE OF YOUR OWN SAFETY! Have a backup plan.
- Do you plan to 'stay and ride it out' on your own? If so, make sure you have food supplies and that all your outdoor decorations are in a safe place, etc.
- REMEMBER: Once you decide to stay and the hurricane hits, you will not be able to leave, and no police or others will come during the storm! So.....when you decide, be sure to understand that will not be able to leave until the storm is over and be prepared for this.
- Do you plan to leave for a more secure location, such as a hotel? If so, now is the time to look into this!
- If you have a pet, most hotels charge a <u>Pet Fee</u>, and many do not allow pets.
- For informational purposes, the Team has put together a <u>Hotel List 2021</u> which is available (and we hope to update it for 2022) for the asking.

#### September Space Coast Launch Forecast

Note:	The launches are coming at the rate of almost one per week, with many being scheduled with little (5-7 days) notice. Updates will be posted to our Launch Alert Facebook page on an as known basis.
ASA SLS – 8/29, 8:33am	The new Space launch System rocket and Orion spacecraft should have launched on its August 29 first flight, for an unmanned test of the new NASA moon rocket. Backup dates are available in early September.
Space X – Starship (update)	Space X is moving towards making its first launch attempt of its colossal Starship/Superheavy rocket in Boca Chica, Texas on the Mexico border late in September. This privately funded vehicle is the largest most powerful rocket ever built, standing 400' tall, producing over 17 Million pounds of thrust (more than twice the power of the Saturn 5) and able to launch 300,000 pounds to orbit. Operational vehicles will also be fully reusable. Note that construction is now underway to build a second pad for it at LC-39A in Florida.

#### The day a Fishing Tournament scrubs a launch

It was on May 20, 2000, that Lockheed Martin was trying to launch its first Atlas 3A rocket powered by the new Russian RD-180 engine. After 3 scrubs they hoped that the forth attempt would be successful. However, during a bizarre countdown at LC-36B at Cape Canaveral the Range Safety officer for the USAF noticed a boat was in the launch danger area. Before long they were identifying over 70 boats in the restricted launch danger area under the rocket's flight path. The boats were part of the scheduled Cal Dixon Offshore Classic fishing contest scattered miles east of the coastline. Early that day launch warnings had been issued, however many boats did not receive the updated warnings. For 2-1`/2 hours a Coast Guard Cutter and two Air Force helicopters tried to shag the boats out of the launch danger area after the original launch was delayed. Finally at T-5 minutes the range said they were go, but because of the extended delay, an issue with the RD-180 fuel system ended up scrubbing the launch. It was later successfully launched on 5/24/2000.





## A PETS' STORY
