

As I write this article it is November 15<sup>th</sup>. I am leaving on vacation tomorrow. There is still a storm which we are watching that might come this way. Deadline for Gator Tales is November 20! So...I will give you my thoughts today. Hopefully, this storm keeps moving west and is not a problem. But the point is that on November 15<sup>th</sup> we are still watching hurricanes!

2024 looks much like 2022 with one major hurricane and the possibility of another one this month. Of course, we had a big one in October and many more close calls this season.

Living in Florida we all 'signed up for this', so to speak, so the weather is not a surprise.

The **Emergency Preparedness Team** has been active throughout hurricane season and before, providing information to everyone at the start of the season. Over the past two years the Team has lost quite a few volunteers. With fewer volunteers the Team cannot do as much as they would like. For example, our Zone concept works best when we have two or three members in each zone. In 2024 we have struggled with this and many have given more of their time to help with this problem.

I believe the Team contributes a lot to the hurricane preparation efforts here. However, I also feel that the HOA should look at this and ask if this is something that should be continued.

Has the Team been helpful?

Is the Team needed?

Is there a better way to do things?

Or, should everyone do things their own way with no formal Team?

The HOA should look at this. The cost to the HOA is minimal. The lack of new volunteers suggests that there is not much interest. This has been building for a while. Several Team events have not been well attended.

My name and contact information is included in the monthly article. People are encouraged to contact me with questions, etc. I think it is significant the in 2024 I have received no calls, texts, or emails. This suggests once again that there is not much interest.

It has been an honor and challenge to be Team Coordinator for the past few years. The Team volunteers are a terrific group of caring, giving, and knowledgeable people! We are so fortunate to have such individuals volunteering on our behalf! I thank all of you from the bottom of my heart.

# **Chill out this Holiday Season**

People get together with good intentions of celebrating, but sometimes the combination of parties, alcohol, traveling, and visiting with relatives you haven't seen in a year can create a perfect storm, and then 911 is called.

If you find yourself feeling overwhelmed or stressed out this holiday season, or at any other time, please take advantage of some tried and true coping methods:

Take some deep breaths-put yourself in a room where you can be alone, and concentrate on just taking deep breaths until your mind is clear. Spending just five minutes doing this can do wonders for your peace of mind.

Remove yourself from volatile situations – especially if you're around someone violent or who refuses to leave. Do your part to not escalate, but to de-escalate.

Be patient with others-especially if they're being opposite. Those angry drivers who honk and make obscene gestures? Ignore them. Go about your day. You can't fix that can't control that. And please drive slowly and carefully.

Above all else, try to remain positive and realize that you can't control everything, but you can control how you react to any situation.

If you find yourself stressed out or depressed to the point where you don't feel you can control it, please call one of the many mental health hotlines available. Knowing when to ask for help is extremely important. You should not be embarrassed or ashamed to reach out for help.

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


