

Have You Checked Your Hot Water Heater Recently?

As homeowners and renters at Lake Hammock Village we often take our hot water heaters for granted.

Speaking for myself, I've always paid attention to the roof and the air conditioning system. I review the electric and water bills each month. However, I never paid much attention to the Hot Water Heater – as long as it did its job – provide hot water – until something happened and suddenly it had my full attention!

Hot Water Heaters are ugly, and, in many cases, they are out of our sight. Ours is in an enclosure in our driveway. We walk by it all the time without ever seeing it. They could be anywhere in your home.

I have asked others about this with different responses. One is in the back of a closet. Others are like mine. A few were not sure but knew they had one!

I am sure this was covered in the inspection when we purchased our home, but I really don't remember looking at it.

When we noticed a water leak in 2024, we learned that our hot water heater was <u>seventeen</u> <u>years old!</u> It appears it was not functioning well before it gave out. Who knew?

Here are a few steps you can take right away. Number 1 will not cost anything:

- 1. Find your hot water heater and do a quick visual assessment.
- 2. If it is old or looks worn, get someone here at LHV to look at it. There are people here who can do that.
- If it is older (seven years old or more? every one is different.) Consider replacing it. Cost for one resident was recently quoted (by a plumber) to be about \$ 1,300, about \$ 700 to \$ 1,000 for the actual hot water heater. Shop around. Lowe's had a good price. You will likely need a plumber, but you won't know until you get an assessment.
- 4. You could go through the Gas or electric company. I'm pretty sure they do this. However, be aware it might be more expensive, but something to think about as an option.
- 5. DO NOT PUT THIS OFF. You will be happy you did it.

As most of you know, there are electric and gas hot water heaters. There is also a 'tankless' system. Choose the one that works best for you.

If you are renewing your home insurance, ask about coverage for water damage.

I hope this is helpful to you.



Florida Supports Federal Immigration Laws

After years of federal inaction, the government, at President Trump's direction, is now prioritizing border security, protecting national sovereignty, and enhancing citizen safety. A weak border has fueled the fentanyl crisis –killing over 250,000 Americans- and enabling human trafficking, generating \$13 billion for violent cartels in 2021 alone. Hundreds of thousands of immigrants have also committed crimes after entering the U.S.

The Trump administration's efforts to secure the southern border have significantly reduced illegal crossings. ICE (US Immigration and Customs Enforcement) is also targeting criminal illegal immigrants under the "worst first" approach, prioritizing the 1.4 million individuals with standing deportation orders.

Florida leads the nation in supporting these federal efforts, passing laws to assist in removing criminal illegal immigrants. All 67 county jails participate in ICE programs, allowing cooperation in detaining and removing offenders.

In Polk County, our top priorities are:

- 1. Working closely with ICE to deport those arrested for crimes who are in the country illegally.
- 2. Assisting in removing individuals with existing deportation orders.

Our deputies arrest those who break the law. We do not conduct immigration sweeps in communities, schools, or churches. We actively build positive relationships in diverse neighborhoods to prevent crime and improve quality of life. Law-abiding immigrants who work, attend school, and contribute to society are not our focus. However, all individuals must follow immigration laws and seek legal pathways to citizenship. How that process evolves remains to be seen.

Everyone deserves to live ina safe community, and I will always be committed to ensuring the Polk County remains a great place for all families to live and thrive.


